






You are walking along a canal towpath when your dog pulls free and jumps into the water. Do you...

QUESTION 1

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


Every year many people get into trouble in the water and even drown after going into the water to help their dog.

Dogs can swim and usually manage to get themselves out of trouble.



















You see someone in a lake, calling for help. Do you...

If you see someone in trouble in the water and there is something close by that floats that they can hold onto, throw it to them.

Then call 999 or 112 or find an adult to do this for you.

You should not attempt to go into the water to help them.



Lifeboats

If you see someone in trouble in the water call 999 or 112 and tell them that somebody is in trouble in the water.

An operator will answer and ask some questions about the emergency so they know how best to respond.



Lifeboats

It is important to stay calm and speak clearly.

Give them as much information as you can and listen to what they say to you.
